DOBSON ON COUPS

MORTON'S FORK COUP

When some years ago I first heard the name of this Coup I concluded that either it was a place name or that the play had first been observed there. The name, however, is attributed to a gentleman named Morton who was a Cardinal in England during the reign of Henry VII. He also was what in England today would be called the Chancellor of the Exchequer. Cardinal Morton made a habit of demanding funds for the King and Church from the London merchants. If the merchant lived sumptuously, the Cardinal would argue that the merchant certainly therefore could afford to give. If, however, the merchant appeared miserly, the Cardinal would say: "Aha, my friend. You do not spend much on your day-to-day living. Thus you can give much to your Church and King." So the merchant was damned either way. They were caught in "Morton's Fork." I suppose it could also be called the "Dilemma Coup".

The idea of the following hand was given to me by Mr. Richard Brown, the editor of this estimable publication. It was a hand played by the great Italian champion, Benito Garozzo, (Brown's bridge hero) in the 1969 World Championships. The contract was 3 NT. The hand, however, not only appeared to me to be mundane, but could have been defeated by better defense. I therefore gave Richard's hand to my regular partner, Mrs. Pat Harris, asking her if she would work on it an hour or two and try to come up with a hand on the same principle, but which could not be defeated by any line of defense. I am forced to say that she came up with some imaginative emendations. The result is a beautiful 6 NT contract, brought home by employing Morton's Fork Coup.

The opening lead is the 8 of clubs, but no lead helps the defense. I suggest that you play the hand to make twelve tricks cold before you read on. It was a little tricky to me, but I finally found that if declarer leads the spade 9 at trick two, ducking in dummy, he will find that poor West is impaled on Morton's Fork.

THE COUP WITHOUT A NAME

(currently known as the Scissors Coup)
This play is one designed to kill the entry between opponents. It applies equally well in either notrump or suit contracts. A good example is a suit contract which appeared in Freddy Sheinwold's column a few years ago. He didn't call the Coup by name in the article, but it is known in Bridge circles by the appelations given above.

This is Sheinwold's published hand.

South plays in four spades, West leading the nine of hearts, which suit his partner has bid. South ruffs, leads a high spade, taken by West, who continues with the five of hearts. Again South ruffs and leads another high trump. West takes and leads the diamond Queen, taken by East. Unfortunately for declarer a heart continuation now promotes West's spade eight and down one he goes for a huge swing in an IMP match and perhaps below average in Match Points.

If declarer had employed the "Coup Without a Name" he either would have discarded his singleton diamond at trick one or led it at trick two. This would have cut the communications between the opponents and declarer would have lost a diamond and two spades only.

THE SMOTHER COUP

This manoeuvre is commonly referred to as the smother "play". However it fits the definition of a coup and is therefore included in this interminable series of articles.

It rarely obtains at the table inasmuch as when the circumstances are correct for it declarer can often bring in the hand on an end-play or a simple or complicated squeeze. The following is a fairly standard situation and is similar to many other hands we have all seen here or there.

North-South, discovering they had a spade fit, all the Aces and missing only one King, found the not bad contract of six spades. It is "obvious" to the average player that this cannot make, as declarer would appear to have to lose a trump trick, while there is no parking spot for his low heart. West, having not much better to do, started proceedings with the lead of a low spade. Concluding correctly that a finesse was necessary, South won in hand. A spade continuation revealed the disturbing news. Declarer, never having seen or heard of a smother play, thought reasonably enough that his only hope was to drop the double-ton QJ of hearts. This he now tried with no success. Being tenacious and refusing to concede one light, he now saw little harm in cashing all his clubs, King and Ace of diamonds and ruffing Dummy's last diamond in hand. He had come unwittingly to the following position:

Still not knowing what was going on our hero nonchalantly tossed out his four of hearts, East winning with the Queen. East is now forced to lead one of his two remaining minor suit cards which smothers poor West. That lamentable gentleman is probably still shaking his head wondering what on earth happened to his trump trick.

THE VIENNA COUP

The characteristic of this manoeuvre is that it first establishes a master card for one of the opponents. Then, however, the position being correct for a squeeze, the opponent is later forced either to throw away this master card or to unguard another.

This is my favorite of all bridge coups. It was the first one I ever learned or played and I have found that it occurs fairly frequently at the table and is easy to execute.

After a high preempt in hearts by West N-S reach the excellent contract of seven spades. South knows that thirteen tricks are always there if North has either a sixcard diamond suit or a five card diamond suit and a singleton or void in hearts. As the cards actually lie seven notrump is equally solid, but bridge, I am afraid, is not always an exact science and the optimum contract cannot invariably be reached by even the greatest of pairs and/or systems.

West gets off to a trump lead (no lead defeats the contract) and the play is simple if the Vienna Coup is employed. Run all the spades discarding the club Queen from dummy. Cash Ace of hearts. Run the diamonds..

This will be the position at trick 10.

The ten of diamonds is led from Dummy, South discarding his heart. West is well and truly euchred. He is forced either to throw away his good King of hearts or unguard his King of clubs.

THE COUP EN PASSANT

This Coup has many forms. More frequently it is played so that declarer can make a lower ranking trump against his right-hand opponent. Much less often, by the nature of things, does it so occur that he can either realize a lower ranking trump or trumps in dummy or discard a certain loser. Here is a hand which illustrates the latter.

Against the "normal" contract of four spades, West leads the club King. Viewing the combined holdings with the bridge-player's usual dispassionate air of self-interest, South concludes that his contract is cold against a two-two spade break. If they do not . . well, perhaps there is still hope. He took Ace of clubs and ruffed a club in hand inasmuch if the cards are are right and spades are not breaking he can cross ruff for ten tricks or employ the

Coup en Passant in the process. Cashing two top trumps he discovers the bad break, then follows with Ace and King of hearts and a third heart. It will not help West to grab his trump Queen as then declarer will discard a losing diamond from dummy. Declarer therefore continues his cross ruff making his contract. The Jack and nine of trumps are the Coup en Passant against West's trump Queen.

THE CROCODILE COUP

This Coup is one where one opponent has a tenace position such as the AQ or the KJ and must play the higher of the tenace so as not to end play his partner. In other words the "jaws of the tenace crocodile" must open to swallow the next lower card of partner's holding.

The following hand was played by Glynn Hatfield several years ago. I was his partner. Hatfield is a brilliant player and one of the toughest opponents in Maritime bridge.

After much "scientific" bidding we reached the unmakeable contract of six spades Hatfield took the lead of the heart Q and brilliantly cashed the Ace of clubs. This was followed by two rounds of trumps and the elimination of the red suits. East COULD have obfuscated the proceedings by either playing his club Queen on the first lead of that suit or discarding it on the second lead of trumps, as I am sure "most of you readers would have done!" Our East did not find this play so Hatfield's next move was to lead a low club from hand. West lasciviously took his club Jack. Poor East had been crocodiled and Hatfield made an extremely clever six spades. Players kept coming to us after the game claiming six spades was impossible. Not necessarily so when a Master player is declarer.

THE DEVIL'S COUP

This coup is so named because average players — and perhaps a few experts — viewing all the hands are convinced that there is no play to make the contract. In the end game, however, the machinations that declarer perpetrates upon the opponents is nothing short of devilish.

North and South, realizing that they were probably much behind in a tough IMP match, knew they had to bid to the maximum. Consequently after much mutual partnership suffering, South found himself to be the apprehensive declarer in six spades. West led the King of diamonds and shifted to the club nine. Declarer won in hand and ruffed a diamond. This was followed by three leads of hearts discarding two diamonds. Ruffing the last heart in hand, he went into long thought, finally ruffing a diamond in dummy and leaving this position:

OPEN PAIRS TRIALS FOR 1974 OLYMPIAD TOURNAMENT

The Canadian Bridge Federation is organizing Trials to select Pairs from each Zone to represent Canada in the 1974 Olympiad Pairs Tournament to be held at Las Palmas in the Canary Islands from May 5-May 17th, 1974.

One of these pairs will be selected from Zone 1 which comprises Unit

194 (Canadian Maritime Unit) and Unit 230 (Acadian Unit).

All entrants must be Canadian Citizens or full time residents of Canada and members in good standing of the American Contract Bridge League. Entrants in the Zone 1 Trials must be residents of the Atlantic Provinces. Pairs may be comprised of any two members of Unit 194 or Unit 230 or one member of each unit.

ENTRY DEADLINE

Entries must be received by October 22, 1973. Any entry received after that date will be put on a standby list but will not be guaranteed participation. All entries will be acknowledged. Be sure you receive your acknowledgement.

SUBSTITUTIONS

Players qualify in pairs. After the commencement of play in their first Trials competition no substitution may be made in any partnership for any reason. If a qualifying pair is unable to compete at the next level for any reason, substitution of the pair will be made of the next available ranking pair taken in order from the previous competition. If no such pair is available, the Zone Trials Committee will make substitutions at their discretion. TRIAL DATES (each are six session events)
Qualifying Round: November 16-18, Moncton, N. B.

Zone Finals: February 1-3, 1974. Location to be announced.
