NAOP FINALS FOUR SESSIONS IN THE MARITIMES

ACBL APPROVES MARITIME REQUEST

Two years ago, a record number of players went to Moncton to compete in the NAOP District 1 Finals. It was the first time that these finals were a four-session event. In order to do this, all six units in District 1 had to agree to the same format.

Alas, while Maritime players thought that this was a superior format to the two session playoff, the other four units were not as happy with it and last year the NAOP District Finals reverted to a two-session event.

Once again this year, the Maritimes took their case to the District meeting at the National Capital Regional in Ottawa on May 19. The District agreed to request that we have a two day Final while the remaining Units hold their Finals in two sessions. The ACBL agreed.

This year, flights A (unlimited) and C (non-life masters under 500 mps) will be held in Moncton on Saturday and Sunday, October 27 and 28.

Flight B will be held in Moncton on the weekend of November 3 and 4.

Clubs may hold NAOP qualifying games between June 1 and August 31, 2001. Be sure to participate and qualify as these two weekends are among the best weekends of competition in the Maritimes.

The winners of each event will represent District 1 in the North American Open Pair Finals to be held during the Spring Nationals in Houston, Texas in March 2002.

Winning Pairs will also receive partial subsidy from ACBL for the trip.

In previous years the second place pair from the venue having the greatest participation was also eligible at their own expense. Henceforth, the third qualifier will alternate annually between East and West.

This year the runners-up in the Maritimes will be eligible thanks to a successful coin toss.

So this year the top two pairs in each event will be eligible to go to Houston in 2002. Get qualified and we'll see you in Moncton. (See upcoming tournaments inside)

MEMORIES OF KANSAS CITY

by Edward Hynes

Coming into Kansas City International, there's enough gently rolling farmland to remind us of some areas of the Maritimes. Except there's too much farmland. There isn't enough forest.

Also apparent from the air are several huge quarries. Quarries which supply the grey limestone used in so many of the buildings of the city. For me at least, the prevalent grey will be an enduring memory of Kansas City.

For Edward and I, there would be a fair amount of grey at the bridge table as well. This would not be a week of black and white.

Our first event was the Flight B (0-2000) Knockouts. Teaming up with two charming ladies from KC, we survived for three rounds before meeting a team captained by Howard Einberg, of Los Angeles. We were slightly ahead at the half (I won't say how slightly). Then, the California team got serious. The second half was like being on the Titanic during a missile attack. There were no survivors. We had to content ourselves with a tie for 5th through 8th and the knowledge that we were the only team to be ahead of Einberg (even briefly) as they went on to win the event. As I said, GREY!

We failed to make the cut for the second day of play in the NAOP 'B'. GREY! DARK GREY! Still, both of us thoroughly enjoyed playing the unstratified, unflighted Open Pairs where most players had more masterpoints individually than we did combined.

Now for a couple of hands:

First hand of the Open Pairs and you pick up:

★ AKQ9732 ♥ 105 ♦ - **♣** 9754

North passes, Partner opens 1♦, South passes, you say 1♠, another pass from North, and Partner comes up with 2NT. Back to you!

6♠ seems right. The ♣J is led and Partner showers down with:

♣ J 10 ♥ K986 ♦ AKQ103 ♣ AQ

You rise and pitch Hearts on two Diamonds. Now, the $\clubsuit Q$ loses to South's King who switches to trumps. You win, ruff one Club in dummy and the last Club goes away on the last top Diamond. Plus 980. 46 on a 64 top! A Heart lead sinks the slam. It still feels grey though when the recap shows a few 990 scores. Sure enough, unless South finds the passive defence of a Spade lead, 12 tricks are always available for the No Trump slam. With this field, passive is rare.

Now, think about this hand. You're in 7♣ (all Vul) holding:

★ A2 **★** K 104 **∀** AQJ64 Opposite **∀** 5

AK4 ♣ Q 10852

A small Club is led. Dummy's 8 holds, and everyone follows low when you lead a small trump to your Ace. Despite wishing you were in 6NT with the sane players, is there any hope? Give yourself the one, or two, minutes available at the table and try to develop a plan.

Before answering, one more greyish hand (All Vul). As Dealer, you hold:

♠ A96543 ♥ 74 ♦ AJ983 ♣ -

"Six-five, come alive" and "The Rule of 20" seem to apply. So you say 1♠. LHO chirps in with 2♥, Partner gives you 3♥ (limit raise). You like your 9 HCP. You go to game.

The ♣A is led and Partner tables a pretty fair hand:

♣ J 107 **♥** K109 **♦** Q **♣** KQ 10975

Ruff, ♦A, ruff D, toss a Heart on ♣K, another Heart on the ♣Q as LHO ruffs with the stiff ♠K. Ending with 10 tricks and a grey score of 40 out of 64. In Kansas City, the uptrick was important even when bidding a tight game.

Now, for that Club grand...

It's tempting to pray for someone to hold three Hearts to the King. But, even if that happens, there are entry problems (plus that outstanding trump). It's nearly impossible to sort out.

So, a more major miracle is needed. A single, or doubleton, ♥K (either side) is one option. (A 1.3% chance, according to the Encyclopedia). That sets up good Hearts to allows discards of dummy's small Diamonds. But dummy's small Spade still has to be ruffed with the top trump in hand. So the opponents' long trump must be with the long Hearts because there's now no entry back to hand. It's still too complex! There must be a better way!

Maybe there's a single, or doubleton, ♦Q (2.82% odds). You cash the AK and down tumbles the Q from RHO. The card gods are smiling on you. Granted, you still face a 50-50 guess to take either the simple, or the ruffing, Heart finesse. If you went with the ruffing finesse, you're a hero. Opponents' cards:

★ 87	♠ QJ965
♥ K 1032	♥ 987
♦ 10 975	♦ Q4
▲ 103	* 76

In Kansas City, someone worked it out at the table. But not at our table!

If you picked the right line before seeing the answer, I hope you have good luck next year in Houston.

CAPE BRETON PAIR PLACES IN 15th WORLD WIDE BRIDGE CONTEST

Mark Spear of Port Hawkesbury and Karl Hicks of Dominion formed a last minute partnership that was successful beyond their expectations. On Thursday night they made tentative arrangements to play in the 15th World Wide Bridge contest game at the Cape Breton Duplicate Bridge Club in Sydney on Saturday afternoon. These arrangements were finalized at the Friday night game where Karl kibitzed Mark and Bernie Britten.

On Saturday, there were five full tables (just enough to be eligible for world comparison) and a 27 board howell was played. They had " a good game" and an "enjoyable game". When the smoke cleared their game was a whopping 74%+.

The results were emailed to World Bridge Federation headquarters and their scores match pointed against the rest of the field and their score was slightly over 71%, good enough to put them in seventh place overall and the only North American entrants to make it to the top ten.

A total of 13,000 pairs participated in the contest.

This was a second overall ranking for Karl, who, partnered with Ron MacDonald, of New Waterford, placed third in the World in the 3rd Epson Worldwide Instant Matchpoint Game in 1988 with a 77.9% game.
