IS IT MY LEAD?

Several years ago I attended a sectional tournament is Summerside, Prince Edward Island. Other than being famous for superb potatoes, sandy beaches, world class golf courses and bad bidders, P.E.I. also has bragging rights to the Confederation Bridge, a 9 mile long causeway which links it to the mainland. Born and raised on the Island I can attest to the bad bidding and offer the following hand from the Open Pairs as proof. Plaving with my third and final wife (one gave up on my bridge, the other because I played it). I picked up vulnerable vs not the following: Void, KQxxxx, x, KQ109xx and opened 1 Club in 1st chair. Partner responded 1 Diamond and I re-bid 1 Spade. When partner's next call was 4 Spades my heart was racing faster than Secretariat's at the Belmont many years past. There was not a lot of bidding room left to explore for slam, but in my alleged mind, partner could have the right cards for 6 or possibly 7 Spades; overlooking the simple fact that partner would have used 4th suit forcing with such a big hand instead of taking a chance of being passed in game. I like Keycard Blackwood and try to abuse it at every opportunity so I called 4NT, to which partner responded 5 Clubs, 1or 4. Surely she has 4, and just before I was about to bid 7 Spades, I remembered it was matchpoints and that the gold lies in No-Trump. I bid 7NT hoping the Club Jack would fall and my wife would sing my praises all the way back across the famous bridge and right through to Halifax. My LHO, a gentle Island lady, looked at her hand, looked at me and asked "is it my lead"? I sadly confirmed that it was, she doubled and lay down the Ace of spades after the auction ended. My wife shook her head in amazement as she tabled J10xx AKQx 10xxx x. She next cashed the club Ace and switched to a diamond won by her partner's Ace. Being a clever player, in case you haven't already noticed. I discarded red on red by throwing my heart. Believe it or not she returned a club and I went for 800 instead of 2000. We of course got our zero anyway, which, to my wife, I blamed on the small field. On the next hand I misdefended 1 Notrump doubled against the same pair by playing 2nd hand low on the opening lead, allowing declarer to score a doubleton Q for her 7th trick. The trip back to Halifax was somewhat longer than expected and there were no songs of praise. We are still married and still play bridge together. I also received a nice postcard from the girls in P. E. I. Keycard Blackwood remains on our card but I am banned from using it with a void in a suit or in my brain. As for Secretariat, he never took up bridge but did win the Belmont and the Triple Crown. Then he was retired to stud. Oh what might have been!

MISSING THE MARK

One would be hard pressed to remember a Halifax Can-At that Mark Molson did not attend. He and Boris Baron were here in 2004 plaving on a team that included Jerry Helms and they probably set a record with 5 or 6 second place finishes in team events over the week. He joined us for our closing party, all smiles and looking forward to a Newfoundland trip with some of his teammates. The competition was over, time to relax, show pictures of his daughter, have a few beers and share some fun bridge hands. He was also an avid supporter of our calcuttas, no doubt because he knew that, with Boris, they had a good shot at taking our money, which they did to us, it was worth the price both for the entertainment and competitive values. Like many others in the bridge community, we mourn his early departure. The English use "bloke", the Aussies use "mate" and Maritimers use "buddy". Miss you buddy, God Bless.

Borrowed from the "Bridge On the Beach" Penticton Regional There are side games at almost every session of this Regional, grouped into three series. The Thursday thru Sunday Morning side games are the **Morning Series**. The **Afternoon Series** runs Wednesday thru Saturday starting at 1:00 and the **Evening Series** Wednesday thru Saturday start time 7:30. You can play in as many of these as you wish; once you enter a series you don't need to stay in it to the end.

Masterpoints in all of these games are red, with some gold points to a few pairs at the top. You can win gold points awards by playing at least two sessions in any **side game series** and having two good games. Your top two percentages scores (even if you played with different partners) are added together and compared with all other individuals to decide the **side series** leaders. If you play three games in **a series** and have 64%, 27% and 59%, your "I wasn't awake yet" game will be tossed and you'll get a score of 123% for the series, and you'll probably win some gold points!
